

# Uki Phone Tower Goes Up

Uki residents will soon be able to access enhanced 3G mobile phone and wireless broadband services following the erection of a 30 metre telecommunications tower on a rural property in Meadow Place, near Uki village.

The facility was built to service the Optus network and should become operational in May.

Uki village is the chief target area, but many other locations within




roughly 5km can also expect service improvement, topography and distance being major determinants.

At this stage, only users of the Optus network will benefit, but in the future other carriers may wish to co-locate their infrastructure on the tower.

As locals will know, the tower has not come without controversy. Over the last 18 months many Uki residents have objected to locating the tower in Meadow Place, and on three occasions Tweed Shire Council deferred approval, requiring Optus to find a more suitable location. Despite this, the Meadow Place site was ultimately given the green light.

As fate would have it, in the same week the tower went up, a

## Locals Say NO to Coal Seam Gas Exploration

In a bid to stop our Green Cauldron becoming the "Gas Cauldron", local lobby groups have united. The Northern Rivers Guardians (NRG) and the Tweed Combined Rural Industries Association (TCRIA) last month announced a united front in a fight to stop any planned coalseam gas mining in the Tweed, of which around half is covered by exploration licences.

In a show of support, Tweed Shire Council has demanded a moratorium on all coal-seam gas exploration in the shire and is rushing to head off an exploration licence that is expected to be determined in the next few days.

Council also agreed to provide a submission to the draft NSW Government Coal and Gas Strategy advising that the Tweed Community has serious concerns over the prospect of the "Green

Cauldron" being utilised for Coal Seam Gas exploration and production because of the lack of clear and understandable advice and information of the technology and its impacts on the environment, the amenity, landholders and water quality.

Opposition to coal-seam gas mining has grown since the screening of a documentary on ABC's Four Corners and numerous local screenings of awardwinning film Gasland, as well as protests on rural properties in southeast Queensland recently.

There are many concerns about the impact of the coal -seam gas mining process which involves 'fracking', or hydraulic fracturing, where a mixture of water, sand and toxic chemicals are injected at high pressure underground in order to fracture rock formations and release the coal-seam gas. Aquifers and underground

drinking water sources are at risk from the use of the contaminants and the leakage of gas. In the USA water sources on farming land have been contaminated by the toxic chemicals used.

The new state government has motioned it will push for tougher regulation in response to widespread fears that drilling for coal-seam gas will poison vital underground water supplies.

Also, congratulations to the Smiths Creek Road Sustain-




able Street project. The participants were able to significantly reduce their energy use and footprint, and therefore secure funding for local sustainable community projects – way to go!

## The Dam Story Continues!

## The Ongoing Political Debate About the Byrrill Creek Dam

The Save Byrrill Creek Campaign objects to the claim that the Nationals' recent electoral win in the seat of Lismore is an endorsement for the Byrrill Creek dam. Residents of Kunghur and Uki overwhelmingly showed they do not support the dam (at Kunghur: Greens & ALP 108 votes to Thomas George's 79, at Uki: Greens: 348, ALP: 98 votes to George's 261 votes).

On 17<sup>th</sup> March, at the Meet the Candidates Meeting in Murwillumbah, Thomas George finally stated his case supporting the Byrrill Creek Dam. His statement lacked all credence. His assertion that to extend the Clarrie Hall Dam it would have to be pulled down first, is laughable. A Council staff member was quick to respond the next day in a statement "that if the dam wall was to be raised, the thickness on the downstream side of the existing wall would be increased and the amount of water stored would only need to be reduced to 75%".

I see a local MP's role is to take the time to research and be informed about issues that affect his constituents. I have forwarded and discussed with him a great deal of research and information on the Byrrill Creek Dam over the last six months, including communications from Minister Costa and the reasons he did not allow the dam. We hope Thomas George's upcoming meeting with Council Staff will clarify some of the misinformation being spread around.

A statement from the NSW Liberals and Nationals was issued shortly prior to the election; "We understand there have been mixed reactions to the Council's proposal of building a dam at Byrrill Creek, with many locals in the electorates of Tweed and Lismore expressing their concerns over the potential risks and costs associated with the project. The NSW Liberals and Nationals believe Tweed Shire Council should provide us with comprehensive and detailed information on the project. If elected, a NSW Liberals and Nationals Government would then assess the project, and the issues and risks associated with it."

If this assessment is made in an unbiased way by the Coalition, based on scientific facts, environmental and biodiversity values, with an opportunity for public commentary, and also with the knowledge that there are other options for the future water supply of the Tweed, then I feel our case against the dam is still strong.

# Geolinks Independent Review of the Tweed Council's Demand Management Strategy.

For over a year the CWG and many residents called for an Independent Review of the Council's Demand Management Strategy, to relook at population growth, water consumption and choices made by Council.

I addressed Council at the March Community Access

meeting in reference to the recent Independent Review by Geolink, an engineering consultancy firm of 20 years standing, based at Lennox Heads. They offered to carry out a brief review, free of charge, as they could see anomalies within the Council DMS and Water Options.

The Review's main points indicated:

- At present the Tweed has ample water supply and there is no need to rush into a decision. In fact, with stringent demand management principles it is quite likely a new water supply would not be needed within the projected time frame of 2036.
- 2. A relatively small amount of extra water supply 1,000-3,000 Mega litres is needed by 2036, which is out of proportion to expected yields of either dam: upgrade of Clarrie Hall or a new Byrrill Creek Dam.
- Geolink believe there is an opportunity to consider and re-examine options that involve considerably less social and environmental impact than the shortlisted dam options.
- 4. Undertaking the Demand Management Strategy and the Water Supply Augmentation Options Study as separate processes is unlikely to produce the best outcome as both processes are a means to the same end. The most appropriate and sustainable water supply strategy should be developed by considering all options in an integrated manner.
- 5. It would have been beneficial to include a variety of Combinations of options (e.g. rainwater tanks and localised recycled water or bore water) which was not considered in the final analysis.
- 6. Geolink prepared different examples of alternate strategies of how the extra 1,000-3,000MGL needed could be achieved: which included larger rainwater tanks(10,000lt) used for washing and hot water, and recycled water for gardens and toilets.
- 7. Geolink stated that a recycled water scheme is the most practical in the five Greenfield major development areas: Cobaki, Kings Forest, Bilambil, Terranora and West Kingscliff, and suggested that it be prudent to require the design of the subdivision to include dual reticulation, and that key infrastructure (e.g. pipelines that run underneath roads) should be installed at the development stage, because it will be much cheaper than retrofitting at a later date.
- 8. Dual Reticulation (for toilets and garden use) has been instigated and accepted by many shires and residents Australia wide. It is considered to be an environmental and social benefit, particularly given the poor health of Tweed estuaries. Council is required at present to reduce pollution into Terranora



# Body Strategies to Manage Anxiety and Anger

As I enter the dentist's rooms I notice a familiar nauseous anxiety in my stomach. I have been in this situation before and childhood memories of pain and discomfort are affecting my body even though I am not consciously afraid. I know intellectually that experiences in the dentist's chair these days are much less traumatic than when I was a child. But my body remembers what happened to me before and it is tensing despite my mind!

So... routinely now as the dentist begins his work and I open my mouth, I simultaneously take myself away for a walk on the beach. I concentrate on all my senses. What can I see? What are the sounds around me? What am I touching, smelling, tasting?

In my imagination the first thing I do is take off my shoes. Then I feel the warm soft sand between my toes. I walk forwards, enjoy the squeaking I can get out of some kinds of sand and when the sand becomes harder, I relish the first bubbly runs of little waves over my toes. I notice the soft sun on my cheeks and the light breeze lifting my hair. And as I lift up my eyes I can take in the sight of all that is before me. Immediately my eyes are taken by children splashing and diving in the waves which rise up like glass and then crash in a myriad of foaming bubbles. Far out I see the way the sea changes its colours and the waves swell and dip. In the distance I take in the horizon and a passing tanker. Sounds wash

Inlet. Storm water harvesting would alleviate this too.

I note even the Combined Rural Industry Association and Clarrie Hall farmers have come out in support of dual reticulation for new developments.

To conclude I would like to say with Tweed Shire facing a doubling of population, and in its developmental planning stages for two major developments: Kings Forest (10,900) and Cobaki (10,464), the ramifications of Council decisions made now, will go far into the future.

The 5,000lt Tanks (funded by the property owners) that Council has put forward as their one and only water efficiency for these developments is not in the current "Plan of Commitment" with the Developers. Therefore, at present there is no committed water savings at all for the new developments. For this to happen, with over 20,000 people involved, I consider it is an incomprehensible lack of foresight by Council.

As Geolink's Review pointed out: there is a choice, not just the dams. It is a golden opportunity for the Council to step forward towards a more sustainable water future.

over me and I bring them to consciousness. The laughter of the children's voices, the cries of the seagulls and the boom and crash of the waves. I continue my reverie either going in for a swim or walking further down the beach and onto the rocks which jut out into the bay and all the time I explore, using every one of my senses.

When the dentist wants me to spit out or to answer her/his questions, I do that quite easily and immediately return to my meditation. The procedure continues without any discomfort or pain. All my tension and anxiety has disappeared and my body is totally relaxed.

Neurologists tell us that we can settle our bodily anxiety using our imagination just as well as using the direct experience of our senses.

But direct taking in of sensate information also brings immediate lowering of anxiety or its expression in anger. One young mum told me that each time she felt she was about to explode at her kids she took to running her hand over the stitching and the seams of her jeans. She put her mind on the ups and downs of the texture and as a result she was immediately calmed and able to step back from calamitous behaviour.




# Ever Been Told You Have a Virus?! by Bob Harrell

I have noticed the fraudsters are doing the rounds here again. Many people have phoned me regarding phone calls from some company insisting they have Viruses on their PCs, suggesting they will remove them for a fee. Well, all I can say is, stay well away from these characters. They will enter your PC and you will never know what they are up to. Very dodgy. They charge a fee and require your Credit Card details. Please tell them you do not have a PC, they will end the call and will not call back.

This is IMPORTANT. I have seen many new laptops out in the market that are delivered without any System Discs, what so ever. This is the Operating Disc, namely some version of "Windows". No Virus Scanner is 100% perfect, a few viruses may get through, so, be aware, update your scanner daily and scan weekly.



But I meet with the occasional jewel, like that published on March 21<sup>st</sup> from "Anne F." in Sendai, one of the cities in Japan torn apart by the tsunami. She writes:

"I am pleased to have wonderful friends who are helping me a lot.... I am staying at a friend's home. We share supplies like water, food and a kerosene heater. We sleep lined up in one room, eat by candlelight, share stories. It is warm, friendly and beautiful. During the day we help each other clean up the mess in our homes."

"If someone has water running in their home they put out a sign so people can come and fill up their jugs and buckets."

"Utterly amazing: where I am there has been no looting, no pushing in lines (queues). People leave their front door open, as it is safer when an earthquake strikes. People keep saying, 'Oh, this is how it used to be in the old days when everyone helped one another.'..."

"No one has washed for several days. We feel grubby, but there are so much more important concerns than that for us now...."

"The Japanese themselves are so wonderful. I come back to my shack to check on it each day... and I find food and water left in my entranceway. I have no idea from whom, but it is there."

If people can be thankful when their world has been turned upside down, how much more should we, untouched by earthquakes, flood or war, give thanks (and also do all that we can to help those who suffer).

So, when you wake up in the morning, give thanks for another day. If you live in Uki, give thanks (for it's as close as you will get to Paradise on Earth). When you look up at the mountains or walk through rainforest, give thanks. When you witness acts of love and generosity, give thanks.

Give thanks, give thanks, GIVE THANKS.


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The 2011 Football Far North Coast competition has begun. Uki's senior sides have been training for a couple of months and it is now time to turn that preparation into action.
