8170,500 granted!

Imagine opening your bank statement and a closing balance of \$170,500 jumps from the page at you! Wouldn't you be beside yourself?!

Well, so were the members of UKIRA's Economic Development & Marketing Group when their funding application to Regional Solutions was successful.

The \$170,500 grant will assist with the purchase and restoration of the Uki Buttery and is a is a marvellous boost to the project. However, everyone must realise we will need to fundraise and seek further funding to get this major project to completion stage.

Since our Town Life Workshop in June 2000, when a desire for Community ownership of the Buttery was expressed, much behind the scenes lobbying and negotiating has taken place with Government Departments and the Buttery owners.

There is still a considerable amount of work to be done

before a comprehensive report can be presented to the Community. UKIRA will then seek your input and support to determine the future of our Buttery.

Television Black Spot Survey

Following an excellent response to the Uki Residents Association's recent community survey, a Public Meeting of 20 residents on 16 April decided not to proceed with an application under the Federal Government's Television Black Spots Program.

A successful application under the program would have seen a television tower erected on the side of The Sisters, with the aim of providing improved television reception for local 'Black Spot' properties.

Of the 59 responses to the survey, only 19 (or 32%) wanted the project to proceed. The Public Meeting heard that the Government's offer would have only covered the establishment of the facility, and that the operation costs and maintenance would have been left to the Uki community.

Tweed Shire Council had already stated that it would not provide any financial assistance. There was general agreement at the meeting that the concept of 'selfmanagement', which was an integral part of the Government's offer, presented too many problems for a small residential community such as Uki.

Many at the public meeting were also opposed to the idea

because of environmental impact and electromagnetic radiation.

UKIRA will now advise both the Federal Government and Tweed Shire Council of the reasons for the community's decision.

Results of the survey are presented on page 7. It is significant that more than a quarter of respondents have properties without direct line of sight to The Sisters, suggesting that many Uki residents would not have actually benefited from the facility anyway.

POLICE MATTERS

Continuing a pattern that is proving all too familiar to NSW Police, sections of aluminium handrail have been stolen from the new Smiths Creek Bridge at Uki. Aluminium fetches a good price on the scrap metal market, and several other bridges in the Tweed Shire have been targeted in recent months. The latest theft took place on Easter Sunday. Replacement of the handrail will cost in the order of \$10,000 and will be at the expense of every ratepayer in the Tweed Shire, Council will consider replacing the handrail in a different material. Persons with any information are asked to contact Murwillumbah Police on 66729499.

Because of Uki's distance from Police stations, residents are often reluctant to call the Police. However, the Murwillumbah Police have advised that any suspicious matter should be reported, day or night. Even if the Murwillumbah Police Station is unattended, the call will be received at the Tweed Heads Station.

ROAD WORKS

Tweed Shire Council is set to commence work on upgrading two sections of Kyogle Road, firstly between the roadside stall and Tall Gums, and secondly between Glenoch and Braeside. When this work is finished in August it will mark the completion of the Kyogle Road upgrade between Byangum Bridge and Uki, apart from the section immediately west of Byangum Bridge. Work will not be carried out on this section until the new Byangum Bridge is built, a major project that could still be several years away because it is dependent on funding from the federal and/or state governments.

UKI SEWERAGE

Work is set to begin on the long awaited Uki sewerage scheme. Tweed Shire Council and the Dept of Public Works and Services are in the process of reviewing tenders, and a contract will be let in May. According to Council's timetable, residents of Uki village can look forward to the ceremonial 'first flush' in January 2003.

Under a collaborative arrangement between Currumbin Wildlife Sanctuary and Tweed Shire Council, treated effluent from the sewage treatment plant (on Smiths Creek Rd) will be used to irrigate a plantation of eucalyptus trees, leaves from which will be harvested by staff from the Currumbin Wildlife Sanctuary and fed to koalas resident at the Sanctuary. This will virtually eliminate the need to discharge treated effluent directly into Smiths Creek.

Historical Snippet...

In early 1914 Mr Ryder sold the Uki store to Mr AS Loder, who was a bullock driver in the district.

> Later that year Mr Loder took his family to Duranbah to visit relatives and Mr Beetham, his

manager, went to his hometown Beaudesert.

That same Saturday afternoon, a fire started. It destroyed the Bank, the Post Office, the General Store, the Auctioneer's premises and the residence behind the store.

The Hall was saved by volunteers who

passed buckets of water up to Jim Mitchell on the roof. He kept pouring it down the walls.

The insurance company later bought him a new suit. The store reopened in the Hall and Mr Loder was helped to restock by merchants in Murwillumbah.
